Our history

As the original inhabitants (the Iñupiaq and Yupik) of the villages along the Arctic coast of Alaska, we have been hunting the bowhead whale for thousands of years. Since time immemorial, whaling has been at the center of our culture and traditions. We are spiritually bound to the bowhead whale and it to us. We are the People of the Ice Whale.

The traditions of our ancestors remain at the center of all we do. Our whaling captains are the providers for our communities. They ensure our food security, care for our elders, teach our children, and lead our people. Our whaling captains and wives are equal members of a team, each having specific responsibilities during preparation, harvest, and sharing. Portions of each whale are saved for celebration at Nalukataq (the blanket toss or whaling feast), Thanksgiving, Christmas, and potlucks held during the year.

For thousands of years and myriad changes, they have carried our story, nurtured our traditions, and preserved our sacred connection to the bowhead whale.

Today, as our world changes with lightning speed, the whale, the harvest, and the sharing are the constants that bind our families and communities together, that define our social and leadership roles, that keep our children in school, that allow our elders to pass their knowledge to our youth, that teach us patience, perseverance, interdependence, and generosity. The Spirit of the Whale provides now, as it has throughout history, for our people; it lives within each of us.



About the AEWC

The AEWC was formed in 1977 in response to an international ban on the bowhead whale subsistence harvest, imposed by the International Whaling Commission (IWC) based on an inaccurate population estimate provided to the IWC by western scientists without consultation with whaling captains. The members of the Alaska Eskimo Whaling Commission are the registered whaling captains and their crew members of the eleven whaling communities of the Arctic Alaska coast, including: Gambell, Savoonga, Wales, Little Diomede, Kivalina, Point Hope, Point Lay, Wainwright, Utqiagvik, Nuiqsut, and Kaktovik. Currently there are 167 registered whaling captains.

The AEWC operates as a not-for-profit 501(c)3 with a mission of protecting the bowhead whale and its habitat, as well as the aboriginal subsistence hunting rights of Alaska's indigenous people. The whaling communities rely on the AEWC to protect the bowhead whale and successfully manage the bowhead whale subsistence hunt through tribal delegation of authority and U.S. federal delegation, co-management, and oversight. The AEWC's management practices are a blend of long-standing tradition and modern regulation. The AEWC works closely with NOAA throughout the year to manage the hunt and meet the mandates of the IWC, which are required for quota renewal.



Event Summary

Every six years, following the renewal of its bowhead whale subsistence quota by the International Whaling Commission (IWC), the AEWC hosts a full Whaling Captains' Convention, attended by all registered Whaling Captains from its eleven (11) villages, as well as their wives, who play an equal role in the bowhead harvest.

The Annual Meeting, and especially the full Whaling Captains' Convention are important facets of the AEWC's continued effort to protect and preserve the traditions and food security of its whaling communities. It provides whaling captains an opportunity to learn from each other, share information on hunting techniques, and exchange ideas on meeting the challenges of a rapidly changing Arctic. Additionally, when a new quota is set by the IWC, the division of the quota among the whaling villages is determined at the full Convention. Participation of whaling captains is required to ensure an understanding of what is required under the new catch limits.

The Convention also provides an opportunity for organizations to present their Arctic research or exploration plans to subsistence hunters whose communities may be impacted by their work. This opportunity has proven effective in helping create more meaningful projects with less impact on local communities.

Further, this rich venue allows researchers to present their findings to an audience that lives in the Arctic and obtains the majority of their nutritional needs from the resources it provides.

As a 501(c)3 not-for-profit organization, the AEWC is primarily funded through grants and private donations. Current grant funding does not fully cover the operational costs associated with the work required to meet federal and international mandates, nor does it cover the cost of the Convention.

All financial support will be utilized to offset the cost of this event.



Event Schedule

Event schedule updates can be found on the AEWC website @ aewc-alaska.com. The following items are examples of items which will be included in the schedule.

WHALING CAPTAINS' MEETING

This meeting brings together the 165 registered whaling captains of the AEWC to: meet with federal agency representatives on co-management matters; receive reports on the outcome of harvest and management deliberations at the IWC; agree to village quota allocations; conduct business and provide guidance to the Board of Commissioners; and receive training and share individual results related to the Weapons Improvement Program.

TRIANNUAL MEETING

The AEWC Board of Commissioners meets three times per year. This will be the first triannual meeting of the year and is open to the public with exception of Executive Session breakout sessions, which will be noted on the final agenda.

OPEN WATER SEASON CONFLICT AVOIDANCE AGREEMENT (CAA)

During the Convention, the AEWC spends between a half day and a full day meeting with oil and gas industry representatives, listening to their plans for the coming open water season, as well as negotiating the coming season's CAA.

SCIENCE / RESEARCH DAY

The AEWC has expanded its convention to include an entire day dedicated to science and research. This provides researchers the opportunity to share their research project plans and outcomes with the community and participants from AEWC's whaling villages, as well as to get feedback to improve their projects. Additionally, space will be provided for researchers to display their projects in a poster session during the convention, allowing participants and researchers to connect directly.

POTLUCK & ESKIMO DANCE

The AEWC will host a community potluck and Eskimo Dance during the convention. This is a great opportunity to connect with the community and participate in the celebration of the bowhead whale.

SINGSPIRATION

In collaboration with a local church, the AEWC will host a Singspiration during the convention. At the 2025 convention, the AEWC is pleased to host the gospel singing group, "Guided Lights."
